An indie film maker documents the life of an eccentric recluse who claims to be an 'ex-superhero'. Their friendship develops as the interview explores the chronology of the hero's life. Together they question deeper issues: social norms, concepts of freedom, the social gap, and emptiness found in the hearts of citizens. Finally their conversation turns to the subject of death and transcendence.

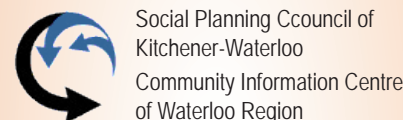
